Gilbert Primary School is helping all students develop the world-class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by continuing our efforts to develop leadership skills, critical thinking and strong work ethic through our academic programs and opportunities provided to students. Perseverance and critical thinking are being developed through our workshop model as students strive to meet personalized goals in the areas of reading and writing.

World-class skills and life and career characteristics are developed in a variety of ways at GPS. For the first time, our students participated every other week in leadership clubs led by staff members. In their meeting time, students, through teamwork and collaboration, used their creativity and critical thinking skills to either design items to share kindness across the school or to participate in activities around common interests. Students also participated in vertical reading buddies to strengthen literacy and community within our school.

World-class knowledge is being developed through rigorous planning and lessons. The focus at GPS continues to be around literacy in all content areas and our implementation of the workshop model. Specific learning opportunities for staff have been around collaboration, data analysis, goalsetting, Lucy Calkins' Units of Study and small group instruction.


Students are continually developing their communication skills. Opportunities for their voices to be heard to make a difference were shared in messages individually and by classes. Some shared ideas in writing, while others created videos with their classmates to share a problem and talk about possible solutions. Students are sharing ideas for change and improvement with adults in the building, so their voices are positively impacting leadership roles, learning opportunities and more. The tech team, led by second-grade students, communicates daily through a live morning news show. We continue to have a partial-immersion program at GPS where classrooms learn math, science and literacy in Spanish.

Seesaw continues to be a tool for communicating with families about the learning and successes happening in GPS. Parents, teachers and students have benefited from the use of this digital learning journal as a way to capture the critical-thinking and problem-solving skills of our students.

We look forward to the continued growth of our school and our community of learners, while growing, learning and leading together.




